Annie Ross House is an emergency shelter for homeless families with children. It is one of the few shelters in Oregon that allows homeless families to stay together, including mothers and fathers, daughters and sons of all ages. Since its opening in the fall of 1986, Annie Ross House has provided temporary housing and support for over a thousand homeless families with children. In addition to shelter, families who come to Annie Ross House receive emergency food boxes and nutrition information, (even after their stay at the shelter,) access to community health and social services, employment help, transportation, parenting education and life-skills mentoring. The shelter is staffed 24 hours a day, and each family is given the attention, care and support they need to regain their self-sufficiency and find permanent housing.

Clackamas County Senior Meals program provides both home delivered meals, most commonly known as Meals-On-Wheels, and congregate meals, which are served at the Senior Centers in a group setting.

In FY05/06 our program served on average 14,086 home delivered meals and 5,950 congregate meals each month. The federal funding that helps pay for this program has not increased in more than 15 years and our need keeps growing as the senior population grows. Any donation helps and it goes directly to the meals program.

We have 10 meal sites, who also serve meals-on-wheels, in Clackamas County. Those locations are the Canby Adult Center, Estacada Community Center, Gladstone Senior Center, Hoodland Senior Center, Lake Oswego Adult Community Center, Milwaukie Center, Molalla Adult Community Center, Pioneer Community Center, Sandy Senior & Community Center, and the Wilsonville Community Center.

Clackamas Service Center provides emergency food, clothing and other services at no charge for the following locations: Clackamas, Damascus, Gladstone, Happy Valley, Lake Oswego, Milwaukie, Oak Grove, Oregon City, West Linn, and Wilsonville. Community Basket membership costs \$15/year or \$5 for four months. Food boxes are available 1pm-3:30pm, Monday-Thursday; clothing is available 1pm-3:30pm Tuesday and Thursday only. Program hours vary so call for more information.

Since 1985, Clackamas Women's Services has safely sheltered over 7,000 women and children within the walls of a three-story farmhouse and a lovely ranch-style home. With living areas painted rich, warm colors, the shelters represent something that many of its residents have not experienced for a very long time—a home that is safe and welcoming, a place of refuge, not a place of fear.

Clackamas Women's Services provides the only two emergency shelters and crisis line for survivors of domestic and sexual violence in Clackamas County. One in eight women are victims of domestic or sexual violence in Oregon and a likely 20,000 of those women and their children live in Clackamas County. Each year Clackamas Women's Services gets more than 5,000 calls for help and 400 of those women and children find shelter at Clackamas Women's Services. Unfortunately, 400 is not enough. Today, nearly 80% of the women and their children who call for a safe place to sleep are turned away due to lack of space. SS of CC plays a vital role in assuring that Clackamas County citizens receive a broad array of services to address problems of hunger, homelessness, inaccessible health care, insufficient public transportation, unemployment, and more.

Last year, SS of CC Dollars:

- Assisted 150 people with emergency needs such as a tank of gas, prescriptions, or the extra \$25 needed to keep utilities from being shut off.
- Reimbursed over 100 volunteers for gas mileage used to provide 20,506 rides to 768 elderly and disabled riders.
- Offered safety fairs, classes, education and support groups, and outreach projects to engage more than 200 low-income families and individuals in self-help and self-sufficiency promoting activities.

Healthy Start/Healthy Families of Clackamas County is a child abuse prevention program that provides one on one parenting support to first time parents through home visiting. Skilled Family Support Workers visit with new parents weekly, bi-weekly and monthly in their own home. Home visits focus on parent/child interactions, child development education, milestone expectations, questions around breast/bottle feeding, sleeping issues, SIDS, shaken baby syndrome, home safety and family goal setting. Healthy Start/Healthy Families also offers free community playgroups throughout Clackamas County for parents and children ages 0-5, and a reduced car seat program is also available.
